I am a Ph.D. candidate in Early Modern History at the University of Connecticut, USA. I will be defending my dissertation, "Henrician Spectacle: Courtly Festivity as Performative Politics in Early Tudor England, 1485-1533", in April 2025. My research focuses on early Henrician spectacle, court culture, and performative politics in the early Tudor state. More broadly, I focus on the politico-cultural syncretism and interactions between the courts of late medieval and early modern Western Europe and the Southern Mediterranean regions. I have presented my work at conferences in the United States and Europe. My research has been awarded fellowships at the Medieval Academy of America and the Richard III Society - American Branch, the Folger Shakespeare Library, and the UConn Humanities Institute. I am currently the Editor-in-Chief of "The Court Observer" for the Society for Court Studies and the Submissions Editor for the Royal Studies Journal.
